Having returned to Norfolk and working full time for six years as a Deputy Headteacher in Attleborough, I took early retirement and then came to work on a freelance basis between Corton House and Brakendon Close in 2012. Since the pandemic I have got to know the tenants in Brakendon Close extremely well, helping Lorraine and Sue out with phone calls, coffee sessions and cover which I have enjoyed immensely. I have also loved working at Norwich Castle, Stranger's Hall and the Museum of Norwich where I have been seen dressed in Medieval Costume, as Florence Nightingale, or an Egyptian Archaelogist to name but a few roles, and delivering sessions to all ages of children.

I shall keep in touch with all my friends in Norwich and will definitely pop in to see you all from time to time. I shall miss everyone but am looking forward to spending more time with my four grandchildren.

We will all miss her terribly, she is irreplaceable! We do, however, wish her much happiness in her new location!


