
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MONTHLY NEWSLETTER FOR CORTON HOUSE AND BRAKENDON CLOSE

The Tradition of Advent

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ADVENT is the period of four Sundays and weeks before Christmas. Advent means 'Coming' in Latin.

This is the coming of Jesus into the world. Christians use the four Sundays and weeks of Advent to prepare, and remember the real meaning of Christmas.

There are three meanings of 'coming' that Christians describe in Advent.

The first, and most thought of, happened over 2000 years ago when Jesus came into the world as a baby to live as a man and die for us. The second can happen now as Jesus wants to come into our lives. The third will happen in future when Jesus comes back to the world as King and Judge, not as a baby.

No one is sure when Advent was first celebrated but it dates back to at least 567 when monks were ordered to fast during December.

An Advent wreath is used in many Churches for the countdown to Christmas.

The wreath is made of moss, holly and ivy with traditionally four red candles - lit on each Sunday of Advent - and a white candle in the centre which is lit on Christmas day, representing the Christ Child, bringer of light for the world.

In many Churches today, the colour purple is used to signify the season of Advent. On the third Sunday, representing Mary, the colour is changed to pink or rose.

The first candle represents Isaiah and the prophets; the second the Bible; the third Mary and the fourth John the Baptist who told the people in Israel to get ready for Jesus. More recently, Hope, Joy, Peace and Love represent the four candles. On each Sunday, the sermon and service usually follow whichever theme is used.

Advent Calendars were popular in Germany in the 1900's, in the UK from 1956 onwards, with the first chocolate calendar in 1958. An opportunity to open a 'door' each day of Advent discovering a Christmas thought in picture word or obviously a chocolate in others. A reminder to us all to prepare once again for Christ's coming.

From Our New Chaplain

I am pleased to have been appointed Chaplain from the 1st of January 2022 and I have been asked to introduce myself.

I began my nursing career at St Bartholomew Hospital in London in 1969, married my husband Andrew in 1971, had 4 children and have 3 grandchildren. When we moved to Norfolk I resumed my nursing career at the Norfolk & Norwich Hospital.

In 1990, I became a lay minister in the Church of England and continued to combine both nursing and preaching.
